Dear Brother & Sister

You will doubtless be surprised to receive a letter instead of seeing me and still more surprised when I tell you that Cousin H<sub>C</sub> has returned without visiting you but so it is and when I tell you how it happened I think you will not blame us we tried hard enough to come but Providence did not seem to favour our plans We partly made our arrangements to go to C<sub>C</sub> on a boat of Franklin Wade; it was to be her in a day or two. So Cousin H<sub>C</sub> went to Clinton and carried Frank to hear him while we were gone and I was to meet her at Maria's and start from there for C<sub>C</sub>.

I should have gone with her to C<sub>C</sub> had it not been for a meeting at one house on Tuesday she went on Monday and I started on Wednesday morning but never arrived at M<sub>S</sub> until evening Mr Roots people brought Cousin H<sub>C</sub> over on Thursday and we were to start for C<sub>C</sub> on Friday but Cousin H<sub>C</sub> was taken ill very suddenly with the nervous tooth ache and headache <sup>and cold chills</sup> occasioned as she supposed by over exertion and taking cold. We thought she was going to be sick and nursed her up as well as we could that night. She was soon better the next morning but we all thought it not prudent for her to start for the west lest it should prove too much for her as her health is very poor at the best and she must necessarily have much fatigue going home. She was very much disappointed and so was I. She intended visiting Auburn as she has many Cousins on her Father's side there, and she was my anxious we should get acquainted with them. Her Cousin Jonathan Ponot has bought him a farm, married, and settled there.

We have had fine times I can assure you. While at Maria's we went

to Julia's and spent the day and rambled in the meadows and picked strawberries and Lillies looked about the old furnace and creek &c.  
The creek and Uncle John's meadows are about the only things that look natural about the Furnace neighbourhood almost every thing else is changed even the "old rustic built done" when of course  
some souls caught the first full ray" is changed though a great deal for the better yet I cannot but feel as Cousin Bradford by now says he does melancholy at the change old associations are lost in a great measure by it. Julia's babe is a fine child. I feel quite proud of my little grandchild. I know that you have seen <sup>her</sup> and can judge for yourself you don't ~~teas~~ <sup>saw</sup> too <sup>the</sup> ~~change~~ <sup>change</sup> in the face of things in W. because you was there before me.—  
Maria's folks have a great quantity of cherries and I eat all I wanted although they were not quite ripe enough to be very sweet. We went to Clinton on Saturday morn and staid until afternoon and they brought us home. Mr Roots people have the finest cherries I ever saw and the greatest quantities. We had as many white hearts as we could eat and they gave us some to bring home. We are to have soon trees of them if we go after <sup>these</sup> or her. Cousin H. started for Ct on Monday she stopped at Albany and New York but is home now this. I am off to New Hartford this afternoon. Shall probably go to H'd., Clinton Fe. I wish you had been here to visit with us and I wish you were here to go with me today. I think I shall have fine times if I do not go too fast. My health is very poor yet though some better than when you left. Mother is not well. She has been too smart. Mr Smith's folks invited Mrs Kendall and Aunt and Mother to come down there to eat cherries they went Tuesday morn on foot and stayed all day and they rambled about Mr S' farm picked cherries & until mother was completely worn out they brought them home but it was too much for Mother she has not been well since. Mr Smith's family are all Henry's wife has gone home to help her mother this summer. I suppose you have heard of the death of Judge James Dear of Utch. The next week after his death Mr Spencer Esq lost his son James by the scarlet fever. William has been very sick they have not expected his life from one to

the constable had found him. Mother was almost crazy.  
He has got into business at Butlers grocery store and is steady  
so far but has become so important that no one must touch  
him on any wise he must have the best the house affords and
